HISTORY TALK - SATURDAY, 9th JUNE at 2:00pm by BILL LAVARACK

The History talk will be "The Friends Farm on the Mooloolah River".

In 1868 a group of Quakers or 'the religious society of friends' from Sydney selected blocks of land upstream on the Mooloolah River flood plain. Their idea was to set up a utopia free from sin. They established a commune and started a farm growing sugar cane. This was the first attempt to grow sugar on the Sunshine Coast, but it was poorly planned and, about three years later, floods wiped out the enterprise. Two of the 'friends' were Joseph Dixon and Gustav Riebe who then selected just up the hill on Buderim, becoming two of Buderim's earliest pioneers.

President's Report May 2018

Following on from the recent fire audit and the findings from the inspector, Ruth and I have produced draft fire plans for Pioneer Cottage and Vise House. Once finalised these documents will be included in the information folder for door guides. The evacuation diagrams have been refined and a sign erected near the garbage bins to direct people to the area for assemble in case of a fire. The recent rains have been very beneficial for the garden and the new turf, but there is still a small leak in the roof above the dining room.

The roof plumber returned to inspect the roof again, but his visit coincided with the school visit by Matthew Flinders students, so he will need to return on another day. The outside toilet has now been repainted and plumbing fittings replaced.

Our intrepid volunteers have been busy cleaning and refreshing the displays inside Pioneer Cottage, room by room, resulting in very positive feedback by recent visitors to the cottage. We still have two grant funded projects outstanding; the preparation of an Interpretive Plan and conduct of a Preservation Needs Assessment. The consultants engaged for these projects have been fully occupied on other work, and Sunshine Coast Council has approved extension of these projects to the end of June to enable completion.

The highlight of the last month was our presence at the Sunshine Coast Council Heritage Showcase, held at the Eumundi School of Arts on Sunday 22 April. Prue put together our display, which included items from our collection relating to World War 1 and information about Eric Foote and the Foote Sanctuary. The adjoining booth was occupied by the Tramways Group and Prue did a demonstration of butter making. The Cultural Heritage staff from the Council were happy with the quality of displays and the level of patronage, stating that the numbers were higher than past years. It was an opportunity for members of local Historical Societies to network and compare notes and many visitors to our booth indicated an intention to visit Pioneer Cottage soon.

The Sunshine Coast Council have staged several workshops in the past month to improve the skills of our volunteers.

Following on from the inaugural Open House event in 2017 the Cultural Heritage staff at Sunshine Coast Council have invited us to participate in the 2018 Open House, to be held on 20 October 2018. The organisers aim to involve 30 buildings across the Sunshine Coast with support from Sunshine Coast Council, Noosa Council and the Australian Institute of Architects Qld Chapter. We are in the process of putting together a small brochure based on the Buderim walks brochure, for a shortened walk starting and finishing at Pioneer Cottage.

School visit

Education report

I recently attended a two-day workshop at Bankfoot House on "Museum Cleaning" which was run by the Sunshine Coast Council for Bankfoot House volunteers. I was the only person not on their staff invited ! (does this mean they think the Cottage could be better cleaned or just that they know we are willing learners ?)

Bankfoot House was built in 1868 and is a state heritage-listed property and the oldest surviving residence in the Glass House Mountains. Cobb & Co coaches travelling between Brisbane and the Gympie goldfields used the property as a lunch stop and staging post. It was donated to the council with everything still in it. This has presented them with a huge job of accessioning everything as well as cleaning it now as most of the items have been displayed or stored.

I am now more appreciative of what our forebears at Pioneer Cottage did. It is a huge job and a very detailed one.

We are going to have another Cleaning Bee at the cottage on the 20th July at 8.00 am.

Jess attended a class at the SCC library on transferring data from cassettes to hard drives and she and I are going to Nambour library to start our process this month.

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
