# President's Report June 2021

# Cottage Volunteers

We have been very fortunate with the acquisition of a number of new volunteers which certainly will assist our future efforts of succession planning for our organization. Some of our new volunteers bring with them skills that will assist and support our long term members. The willingness of the new members to volunteer their time means that Ruth has been able to form a roster that has spread the work of the Guide Volunteers across a larger number of people. A great outcome of this

activity is that we are now in the position to be able to add Monday once again to our opening hours of the cottage. I thank all our volunteers, old and new, for the wonderful, continued work that they do for our organization and Pioneer Cottage.

# Membership

I thank Ian Jackson, our Membership Manager, for his timely reminder about the payment of this year's membership dues. The dues remain at pre Covid levels with Single membership being \$15, Couples \$20 and Life membership \$85. # Peregian Beach College Visit

I am pleased to be able to report that we had our first post Covid excursion to the Pioneer Cottage on the 10 June. While the group was only small, 12 Year One students, never the less worked well as a rehearsal for larger groups that will be attending. Ruth and myself divided the group into sub groups and we systematically did each of the five designated areas in the cottage precincts. The resource folders and printed work sheets for the pupils worked well with the direction of our guides. The class had been immersed in knowledge provided by a great-grandparent from the bygone years. The students were very receptive to what they saw and were able to relate the items in the cottage to what they had heard from the great-grandparent visitor's talk. I am currently awaiting the return of the evaluation form from the class teacher to hopefully affirm the success of their visit to Pioneer Cottage.

# Electrical Certification

Following the electrical inspections and resultant remedial work carried out on Pioneer Cottage and Vise House our buildings now stand with a "clear bill of health" for all electrical matters. Given the total of the invoices of the work carried out David forwarded the accounts to the BWMCA who kindly accepted financial responsibility for the accounts. Certificates were issued by KAE which approves the competency of the electrical systems of our buildings.

# History Talk By Neil McGarvie OAM



Neil McGarvie was our guest speaker at our History Talk on the 5 June. The topic for the presentation was 'Buderim community projects where Buderim Historical Society had played a significant role'.

# 1. Buderim-Palmwoods Tramway Projects.

Information from BHS in1993-4 raised my interest in the Palmwoods to Buderim tramway remnants (it was actually a light-rail line) which was built from 1911 and then operated from 1914 to 1936. I really enjoyed chasing up details from many remarkable Buderim informants. I prepared a Conservation Plan for the tramway remnants and the local Council used it to inform their work with the Buderim volunteers on the Telco Rd walking track.

The Secretary of BHS moved, through BHS, to have the tramway walking track land that extending down towards Forest Glen for about 1600 metres, and which

was still Council owned, Heritage Registered with the Environmental Protection Authority, (as it was then known), so that it could not be built on or disturbed.

It became known where the Buderim Tramway's German Krauss loco was located and where the remains of the other loco, the American Shay, were, these being the two Buderim Tramway locos. BPHTI was able to purchase the Krauss using discretionary funds provided by the Mayor of the time, and other supporting Councillors. The Krauss has now been cosmetically restored from a very dilapidated condition, by BPHTI, and it is awaiting a decision on a display site in central Buderim.



During this time the volunteers also worked with the relevant Government Department of Natural Resources and Mining and had the unnamed creek, that flowed below the large wooden tramway bridge near Telco Rd, officially named 'Tramway Creek'. Also at the request of local residents in the area, another tributary of Martins Creek rising in park land off Mons School Rd, was named 'Diggers Creek'

# 2. Buderim Historical Time-line.

I was asked by BHS to begin research for a history of Buderim and BHS applied for the funding of this planned project, but the book was not produced at that time. The recent publication of a Buderim history named 'Timber, Trains, Turmoil' by the President of BPHTI has recorded it all very well. However, I assembled all the gathered records of happenings and dates in Buderim, that I had drawn from BHS records, into a Buderim History Time-line with BHS assistance.

# 3. The history of the Aborigines in the Buderim area.

It had been noted that very few Pioneer Cottage records addressed the local, present and past Aboriginal population and my wife, Jean, and I began some research from already existing written and printed records, to write an essay for BHS aimed to develop further the Aboriginal and South Sea Islander ("Kanaka") segments of Buderim's history.

4. South Sea Islander and Aboriginal heritage in Ballinger Court Park between No 8 and No 10 Ballinger Court in Buderim. We were involved with the volunteer efforts to conduct community working bees on a Council block next to our home with the aim of establishing a public bushland park. As the park took shape I checked out the area with BHS and found, in the red cedar box in Pioneer Cottage, a plan and photo of a permanent camp that had existed on the park area and which was used by South Sea Islander workers in the sugar industry in Buderim's early days! Many Aboriginal women had married SSI men. Burial sites existed in the park area.



BHS assisted in the search for the history of this park area and then included it in the 'Buderim Walks'/'Walk Buderim' locations, that they had prepared for Council.

# 5. Early General Buderim History.

Just a couple of historical facts picked up along the way that some may not be aware of:

One of the main unloading points, for ship's cargo in and out of Buderim, had been a wharf in Eudlo Creek and an associated large shed both of which were located off Fishermans Rd, Kuluin, adjacent to the roundabout near Neil Manson's garden supply business.

William Pettigrew, who was at one time Lord Mayor of Brisbane and whose ships serviced the Buderim area, built a saw-mill at Maroochydore and he also donated land and building materials for the building of Buderim's first Provisional School in Panorama Cres on the left of Mooloolaba Rd, past Foote Ave, as it goes down the hill from Buderim.

#### Conclusion.

As a group we are Buderim residents interested in history/heritage issues so it is vital that the important organised groups within the community, for example Buderim Historical Society (BHS) and Buderim War Memorial Community Association (BWMCA), and such bodies are supported and nurtured. Without the continued input of these long-standing citizen originated groups the orderly advancement of Buderim and its history, will be threatened.

The gardens may be looking a bit bare at the moment as work this month has concentrated on pruning the perennial shrubs and propagating plants for planting in July. Plant of the month would have to be the monster with spiky blue flowers, growing next to the front steps into the Cottage. The plant, *Pycnostachys urticifolia*, is commonly known as Hedgehog Sage. Lorraine and I are continuing to work on the plant picture album. It is a slow job, waiting for plants to come into flower and be photographed (Lorraine), a sample taken, pressed, dried and sent off to the Qld. Herbarium for identification (Lois).
