Pioneer Cottage Attendance in 2023

Ruth Ormerod has compiled statistics on the number of visitors to Pioneer Cottage. In all, there were 1,521 visitors to the Cottage, including group visits (eg, from Retirement Villages) and school excursions. This indicates that visitation is recovering after the Covid pandemic, but there is still a way to go to reach the attendance level of about 3,000 in 2019.

Sunshine Coast Council Grants

Sunshine Coast Council has notified BHS of the success of the application for funds to purchase and install a replacement garden shed and mulcher, to help with maintenance of the Pioneer Cottage's Garden.

The Council has also transferred funds to purchase a touch screen and hard drive for the museum room at Pioneer Cottage. The touch screen will provide a means of giving museum visitors the chance to look through the significant historical photos in BHS' photographic collection. BHS member Ross Eason with assistance from other BHS members is currently re-digitising these photos for display through the touch screen. The touch screen will also provide a means of making other historical material in the BHS collection available for public viewing.

BHS is undertaking further investigations requested by the Council, in order to obtain funding approval under the Council's Collection Care program to conserve and restore selected artwork and photos.

Interpretation Plan for Pioneer Cottage

As reported in our last newsletter, the Sunshine Coast Council has selected the BHS to obtain expert assistance to develop an interpretation plan to guide the museum layout in Pioneer Cottage. BHS will get four sessions with Josh Tarrant from the Queensland Museum.


At the first session in December 2023, Josh provided an overview of the process of Interpretation planning before the group discussed what had changed since the Stage 1 Interpretation Plan report was completed in 2018. Josh indicated the scope of this exercise is better suited to planning a single exhibition rather than attempting to address all the issues identified in the 2018 report. The process of developing an interpretation plan for a single exhibition can then be used by BHS after the project to address the issues in the 2018 report.

Options for semi-permanent or short-term displays will enable more of the collection currently in permanent storage to be viewed by members and visitors. Once a topic is agreed with Josh, he will help us with the detailed interpretation planning for a display using relevant objects, photographs and historical records in the BHS collection.

Buderim history enquiry about Charles Blackman in Buderim

At our Volunteer Update session held on Monday 15 January 2024, Geoff Baker provided an example of the benefit of door guides passing on requests from visitors seeking more information on aspects of Buderim's history. In late 2023, Diana Danielson had an enquiry from a Pioneer Cottage visitor about whether the Australian artist Charles Blackman lived in Buderim in the early 1980s. The visitor was a local resident who was keen to find documentation about his time in Buderim. Diana recorded the enquiry and Ruth passed it on to Geoff for investigation.

Art historian Joanna Mendelssohn has written on Charles Blackman's life and indicated he lived in Buderim in the late 1970s and early 1980s, during the time of his second marriage. According to Joanna, it was during this period that he began to introduce tropical themes into his art, no doubt influenced by the Sunshine Coast environment.



Buried away in the BHS archives was a photocopy of two book extracts about Charles Blackman's time in Buderim. The first is from a 1989 book called *The Art of Charles Blackman* by Thomas Shapcott, published by Deutsch, London. The second is from a 1993 publication called *Charles Blackman: Schoolgirls and Angels: a retrospective exhibition of paintings and drawings by Charles Blackman*, by Felicity St. John Moore and published by the National Gallery of Victoria as part of a Charles Blackman art exhibition.



In the 1993 publication, there is a reference to Charles Blackman renting a house in Buderim in 1979 and then in 1980 buying a Buderim parcel of about three acres with a small shack, which he converted into a studio. He then built a house on the site and the book has a photograph of the house in 1984, taken by his wife at the time, Genevieve de Couvreur.



Thomas Shapcott's 1989 book includes Charles Blackman's own recollections of his time in Buderim, in which he refers to his series *The Canecutter's Dream* as having been painted while in Buderim. According to the 1993 publication, his drawing *The Tea Ceremony*, inspired by a visit to Japan, was completed in Buderim, along with the painting *Celestial Bouquet* and a series of rainforest paintings.

The Sunshine Coast Council library has a digital memoir by Charles' daughter to Genevieve de Couvreur, the singer Bertie Blackman, called *Bohemian Negligence*. Bertie was born in 1982, during the family's time in Buderim. In 2020 Bertie also published a children's picture book called Micah the Star Sailor, for 3-6 year-olds.

Jenny Christensen in particular was delighted to hear about this enquiry – she enjoyed a Charles Blackman painting in her workplace when she worked in the Vice-Chancellor's office at UQ!
